Pain-free and lighter; go for your check-up

On Tuesday, January 23, 2024, Kenya School of Government commemorated Cervical Cancer Month held in January worldwide. In Kenya, according to Globocan 2020, Cervical Cancer month was first commemorated in 2019, when it became apparent, through research and data, that it was the leading cause of death with 5,236 (12.4%) new cases and 3,211 (11.9%) deaths per year.

The day commenced with a public lecture and a free Medical Camp for Breast, Cervical and Prostate Cancer screening. The services were offered by Beth Mugo Foundation, Beyond Zero and Women for Cancer in collaboration with KSG Clinic and Lower Kabete Health Centre.

It was during this special day that Lisper Murugi narrated her story on why she values the benefit of advocacy and awareness talks, including medical camps and awareness.

Lisper's experience started back in 2013, when she started getting back pains, restricting and constraining any vigorous work or lifting of heavy items. She goes back in time, recalling her visit to AAR Hospital that year who at that time, confirmed that she required further diagnosis, but fear and anxiety delayed her visit to the hospital to seek proper treatment. Lisper Murugi continued to endure the pain and discomfort for years, relieved only by painkillers.

This was until she heard, through the memo and KSG internal mail and website, about the Cervical Cancer Advocacy and Medical Camp happening on February 3, 2023 at Kenya School of Government Lower Kabete

Grounds.

That morning, Lisper asked herself "do I go or do I not go?" "But with the medical camp in full sight outside the Convention Centre in KSG Lower Kabete Campus, I, filled with resolve, yet anxious and apprehensive, I visited the Medical Camp.

"I was so nervous, but I found the courage". When asked what made her interested in the camp, she narrated her experience of severe back pain to the healthcare worker.

It was here that her journey began. The nurse upon examination confirmed that she had found a polyp. With calm professional disposition, she assured Lisper that the polyp, which is a growth of tissue from the surface of the body, was not malignant.

Lisper was familiar with the term "*malignant*", especially, that it was used within the Cancer context; and

that this meant that presence of the growth did not confirm the "*presence of cancer*". The nurse further encouraged Lisper to seek further diagnosis using the referral card which she presented her with.

This reassurance should have put Lisper at peace, however quite the contrary! The news caused more fear and apprehension, the result of which Lisper, though having shared her experience with her husband, did not seek further treatment, the whole dilemma continued to weigh heavily on her mind causing her mental anguish. "I mitigated the constant pain through pain killers".

It was not until January 2, 2024 that Lisper boosted with the confidence of a New Year woke up and full of courage visited a health center in Westlands. Unfortunately, the resident Gynecologist, perhaps due to the day of the year was not available so instead she was referred to a general practitioner. "General Doctors and Specialty Doctors, in this case Gynecologists, truly have

different reactions,” says Lisper. Because when the General Doctor examined her, he was not as calm as the nurse she had seen at the Camp. He was disturbed that Lisper had delayed her treatment and caused the growth to enlarge. But to the doctor’s credit, his reaction injected determination, such that one day later, on January 4, 2024, she visited MP Shah Hospital where she was “sure to find all the specialists and equipment under one roof”.

Following a set of tests and screening, the doctors at MP Shah confirmed the presence of one polyp, ruling out any other growth among them Fibroids both in the Cervix and the Uterus. The

doctors however recommended immediate surgery. When asked when she would like to return for the surgery, Lisper, this time and the encouragement of her husband, chose not to leave the hospital and that day checked herself into hospital. That same evening of January 4, she underwent a successful surgery to remove the polyp.

Today, Lisper is pain free and continues her treatment looking forward to a full recovery soon.

Lisper’s story has a happy ending, and one that many can relate to. We can all share a time when we know we should

have sought medical help and postponed it. But most critical, is the time we have delayed or ignored symptoms because of fear and the unknown...those voices in our heads!

Lisper’s story is also one of encouragement too! She ends her story with these words “I am pain free, I feel lighter and can go about my business. I really advise people to go for checkup and visit medical camps when the opportunity arises. She applauded the Cancer awareness initiative presented by KSG, the knowledge gained through the Public Lecture and the free breast, cervical and prostate cancer medical camp’.

Mental wellbeing, Cancer still health major concern

The discourse surrounding mental health continues to hold a prominent position in the agenda of various global communities. In the face of pressing economic challenges, escalating international conflicts, and other socio-economic issues, stress levels have soared, warranting widespread concern. Mental disorders, serving as a significant contributor to the global burden of disease, present a growing challenge to the international healthcare infrastructure.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reports a global prevalence of lifetime mental disorders ranging from 18.1 to 36.1 percent. This statistic underscores the pervasive nature of mental health issues, with more than one-third of the world’s population experiencing varying degrees of mental disorders at

some point in their lives.

A similar concern arises in the realm of Cancer, where recent years have witnessed an alarming increase in infections.

Governments and healthcare institutions are responding by intensifying awareness campaigns, aiming to equip both staff and citizens with the knowledge

required to comprehend treatment modalities and implement effective prevention strategies.

The imperative is to foster a comprehensive understanding of mental health and cancer, ensuring that individuals are empowered to navigate these challenges with informed choices for their well-being.

KSG's Margaret Kenyatta Institute of Gender and Social Development (MKI) organized a public lecture addressing two critical areas, to advance the understanding of prevention and treatment of Mental Health and Cancer. The event was held at Lower Kabete on January 23, 2024.

This initiative was conducted through collaboration of the Beth Mugo Foundation, National Cancer Control Program, Beyond Zero, Chiromo Hospital Group and the Kenya School of Government Clinic. Together, these entities contributed to the dissemination of valuable information, empowering individuals with knowledge on mental health and cancer prevention and treatment strategies.

When addressing the topic of Cancer, Dr. Joane-Paula Bor Malenya, Acting Head of the National Cancer Control Program, highlighted key statistics; 11.7% of diagnosed cancers are attributed to Breast Cancer, followed closely by Lung Cancer at 11.4%, and Colorectal Cancer at 10%.

In Kenya, Breast Cancer leads with a prevalence of 16.1%, followed by Cervical Cancer at 12.4% and Prostate Cancer at 8.1%. Cervical Cancer emerges as the predominant cause of cancer-related fatalities at 11.9%. Dr. Malenya emphasizes a crucial message: Cancer is

preventable and treatable. Cancer prevention emerges as the most cost-effective approach, with 40% of all cancers being preventable.

Primary prevention strategies encompass lifestyle modifications, vaccination against HPV for Cervical Cancer prevention, and Hepatitis B vaccination for Liver Cancer prevention. Additional preventative measures include controlling aflatoxins in food, regulating tobacco and alcohol consumption, minimizing exposure to environmental and occupational hazards, and reducing radiation exposure.

Secondary prevention involves early detection through screening initiatives. Dr. Malenya's message underscores the importance of proactive measures in mitigating the impact of cancer, emphasizing the potential for prevention and cure.

Dr. Rose Ngondi of Chiromo Hospital Group noted that there is a correlation between mental health and productivity in the workplace. Statistics have revealed that depression and anxiety have cost the global economy a staggering \$1 trillion

dollars in lost productivity. In 2020, Ksh. 62.2 billion losses were registered due to mental health issues. This financial toll not only reflects the direct costs associated with absenteeism and presentism and reduced efficiency but also highlights the broader societal implications of neglecting mental well-being.

The implications of Dr. Ngondi's observations extend beyond mere economic statistics. They point to a pressing need for comprehensive workplace strategies that prioritize mental health as a fundamental component of employee health. Initiatives such as employee support programs, mental health awareness campaigns, and destigmatizing discussions around mental health are essential steps in fostering a workplace culture that values and safeguards the mental well-being of its workforce.

The event garnered participation from both course participants and staff members. MKI and the partners had also organized for free cancer screening for Breast, Cervical and Prostate Cancer.

For Japheth Amke, an Electrical Engineering student at EMTI Training Institute, KSG Baringo is a

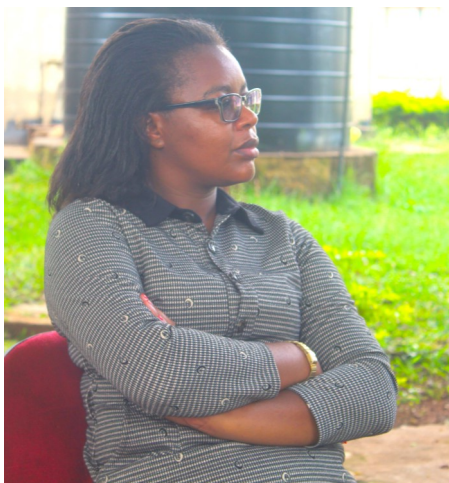
walking distance from his residence making his choice of on-job training quite easy.

This week, Bulletin Writer Rashid Mwinyi shares a write-up from a conversation with one Ms. Elizabeth Kioko, who exhibited enthusiasm and immense contribution during the outdoor learning module of the Strategic Leadership Development Program recently at Matuga Campus.

The writer compiles Ms. Kioko's account of experiential learning, a significant activity she participated in, and some valuable lessons she took home from the program.

She expressed profound delight with her time at Matuga,

describing it as a practical learning to unlock her full potential. She lauded the engaging lectures, well-maintained rooms, and pristine surroundings that contributed significantly to her growth.

She gave prominence to one of the activities she found intriguing, which mirrors how the diverse dispositions and characters of employees in the organization can influence the quality of work.

the process,” explained Ms. Kioko.

Ms. Kioko learnt how to build trust with her team members and the essence of active listening.

“We learnt to adapt to problems, invent, and strategize together. Furthermore, being blindfolded enabled us to appreciate the viewpoints of others in decision making.”

Among the key insights gained from the Strategic Leadership Development Program course, Ms. Kioko highlighted knowledge management, wellness strategies, legal frameworks in resource management, policy-making skills, and talent management. She believes the exposure will significantly enhance her role as a teacher within the Ministry of Education.

“We took home valuable lessons; the need to define the required work output and align the team to business goals. Then, it is very crucial to develop a communication strategy, provide effective training, and implement a support structure. Measure the work done to establish if the goal was achieved.”

For her, other tests came through physical activities such as long treks, outdoor leadership games, running, and debriefing sessions. Ms. Kioko recommended the uptake of the program by public officers joining higher positions in government to transform their understanding of the true meaning of leadership and devotion to service delivery.

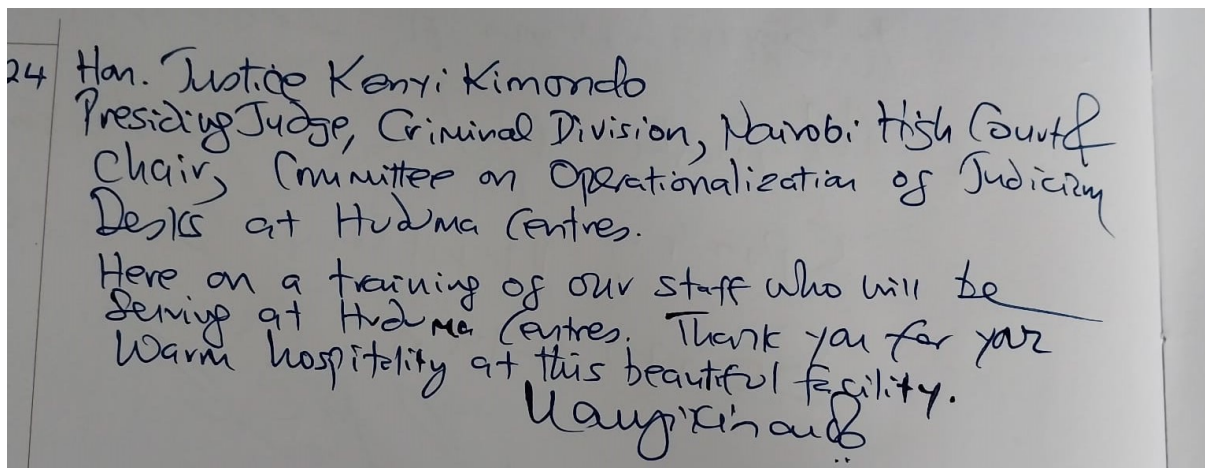
