Research, too, has been a cornerstone of KSG's success. Prof. Mohamed highlighted the importance of reliable data that have shaped key policy decisions and organizational strategies. "Our research initiatives have provided evidence-based insights that have informed key policy said, decisions," h e acknowledging the tireless dedication of the research teams who have worked to produce impactful studies. He praised the faculty at Embu Campus for their numerous publications. "Embu Campus is truly a hub for publishing, and I appreciate the effort the faculty has put into their work. This commitment has motivated our school to establish a publishing house for both our faculty and administrative staff, providing them with a dedicated space to publish their books." He said.

The year also saw KSG host several notable conferences. creating vibrant platforms for dialogue and knowledge exchange. The Africa Schools of Government Conference and the National Pastoralists Conference, which brought together national and international delegates, were celebrated as major achievements. "These conferences were a direct reflection of everyone's hard innovation, work, and commitment," Prof. Mohamed said, applauding the staff for their

these impactful events.

Perhaps one of the most exciting developments of 2024 was the expansion of KSG's consultancy services.

Prof. Mohamed announced the establishment of the Centre for Public Service Competency Assessment and Foresight, a new initiative designed to address complex organizational challenges and improve performance across the public sector. "This will consolidate the structure that will expand the consultancy that we offer to the public service. It will re-engineer our consultancy portfolio to deliver high-impact services that will then improve the public service performance and productivity," he explained.

The new Centre will help the School to expand its use of psychometric and emotional intelligence assessment and other tools to support recruitment, promotions, talent management and succession planning among other things that will be introduced.

Another key theme in Prof. Mohamed's speech was the importance of partnerships and collaborations. He acknowledged that KSG's ability to achieve its mission has been amplified through strategic alliances with government agencies, international organizations, and the private sector.

particularly exciting А development this year was the establishment of the Regional Centre of Competence for Digital and AI Skilling, a collaboration with the Ministry of ICT and Digital Economy, UNDP, Microsoft, and Google. "This is a great opportunity for the School in terms of visibility and affirming contribution to digital our transformation in Kenya," he said, highlighting the government's ambitious plan to annually train 100,000 public servants in digital skills.

These collaborations, along with partnerships with institutions like EACC and IGAD, have expanded KSG's reach and ability to tackle complex governance challenges.

Looking ahead to 2025, Prof. Mohamed expressed his confidence in the School's ability continue building on its to "While we have successes. achieved much this year, there is still more to be done," he remarked.

The challenges facing the public service sector require creativity, resilience, and collaboration. With a renewed focus on excellence, KSG will continue to evolve and meet the needs of a rapidly changing world.

Prof. Mohamed recognized all staff for their dedication and hard work, acknowledging that the success of the School is a result of this unwavering commitment.

Security for Sustainable Development in Coastal Kenya

t a public debate held the at Mombasa Campus, stakeholders from various sectors gathered to discuss security strategies essential for sustainable development in Coastal Kenya. The theme was "Security for Sustainable Development in Kenya: Collaborative Coastal Strategies for Stability and Growth"

The Chief guest Mr. Mohamed Hassan, HSC, who is also the County Commissioner Mombasa emphasized the importance of a multistakeholder approach to regional stability and growth.

The forum underscored the need for security as the backbone of sustainable development, particularly in a region grappling with challenges such as drug abuse, organized crime, and maritime insecurity. Speaking on behalf of the security agencies, Mr. Hassan stressed the significance of community involvement in reporting suspicious activities. "When the community actively participates, especially in reporting attacks or unusual activities, we strengthen security framework. It's our leveraging about the community's proximity to issues timely responses," for he remarked.

Echoing his sentiments, Dr. Atikiya highlighted the delicate balance between improving livelihoods and conserving natural ecosystems. She emphasized adopting marketbased approaches, including

monetary control and surveillance, to manage marine resources sustainably. This dual focus, she explained, would enhance both security and environmental preservation.

Coastal Kenya faces unique challenges tied to its maritime activities, with threats ranging from piracy to illegal fishing. Discussions explored the need for unified legal frameworks to govern resource utilization and protection effectively. "We must harmonize laws across jurisdictions to address gaps that undermine maritime security," said Timo Tito, a key panelist.

The integration of technology in combating emerging threats such as cybercrime was also a focal point. Panelists noted that while technology offers solutions, it also introduces complexities. "Cybercrime and terrorism exploit our digital vulnerabilities. We need advanced systems to detect and neutralize these threats," added Mr. Tito.

Drug abuse emerged as a

pressing matter, with panelists identifying it as a root cause of many security problems in the region. Mr. Hassan pointed out that drug addiction often leads to the rise of organized gangs, many of which are manipulated by political actors during election periods.

"These groups are often for hire, serving political interests during campaigns and devolving into criminal enterprises afterward," he observed. To counter this, the forum proposed a dual strategy: empowering youth through education and employment opportunities while holding political leaders accountable for their roles in perpetuating such issues.

The debate also shone a spotlight on Kenya's legal framework and its limitations in addressing security challenges. Gaps in laws and enforcement mechanisms, particularly regarding the handling of criminal cases, were identified as significant weaknesses.

Security for Sustainable Development in Coastal Kenya

"Criminals often exploit these gaps, walking free despite evidence of their wrongdoing. While we must respect human rights, we must also ensure they do not infringe upon the rights of others," Mr. Hassan argued. The forum called for urgent reforms to strengthen the justice system and enhance the effectiveness of security measures.

In conclusion, the forum stressed that sustainable security in Coastal Kenya hinges on

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collaborative and innovative approaches. Bringing together security agencies, community members, and political leaders is essential to crafting effective solutions. Moreover, addressing socioeconomic issues such as unemployment and drug abuse will reduce vulnerabilities that criminals exploit.

Dr. Atikiya reaffirmed the Campus commitment to fostering dialogue and partnerships for regional stability. "This debate marks the beginning of a journey towards sustainable development. We must work together to transform these discussions into actionable strategies."

As the region looks ahead, forums like these highlight the critical need for unity, vigilance, and proactive measures to ensure Coastal Kenya's secure and prosperous future.

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KSG Contributes to Road Safety Initiatives

ccording to the 2023 economic survey, a total of 3,709 lives were lost by December 2023 on our roads. This statistic reflects a concerning trend, as 4,690 deaths were reported in 2022, compared to 4,579 in 2021-an increase of 111 fatalities and a rise of 2.4 per cent. In light of these alarming figures, the Director of KSG Embu Campus, Dr. Ann Kang'ethe organized a meeting on Thursday, December 5, 2024. This gathering brought together key stakeholders from the transport sector, including representatives from SACCOS, matatu operators, and other relevant organizations. The primary focus of the meeting was to raise awareness about essential road safety measures, enhance safety aiming to standards within the community.

In this meeting, Dr. Kang'ethe

emphasized the importance of collaboration between the Kenya School of Government and transport stakeholders to improve both road safety and service quality. Plans were laid down to organize a dedicated training day for drivers and conductors.

This training will centre on several key areas, including financial literacy; road etiquette to promote safe and respectful behavior on the roads; and grooming and customer service skills, to ensure that transport staff present themselves professionally and offer positive experience to passengers.

Additionally, the participants were encouraged to deliberate on the specific responsibilities each stakeholder would undertake to ensure the success of this initiative. By clearly defining roles and encouraging collaborative efforts, the attendees aimed for an effective :

and comprehensive approach to improving road safety and service quality within the transport sector.

Mr. Abdulhakim Noor, from the National Transport and Safety Authority, emphasized the shared responsibility of road safety. "The Government will do everything in its power to spread awareness, but without the involvement of everyone, drivers and conductors included, our efforts will not succeed. We encourage everyone to actively participate."

Mr. Noor further highlighted the impact of road accidents, "The statistics are heartbreaking. These numbers reflect not just fatalities, but also the many who are injured or who suffer lifelong effects from accidents. It is a sad reality that many others die later from injuries sustained in accidents."

It is critical to prioritize road safety, particularly during the festive season when traffic tends to increase significantly; a period that often involves more travelers, in both private and public transportation, as people attend holiday events.

Implementation of measures such as increased awareness campaigns, stricter enforcement of traffic laws, and encouraging safe driving practices, can help reduce accidents. All road users; drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists, must remain vigilant and considerate to promote a safer driving environment for everyone.

The African Art of Storytelling; Relatable Characters, Metaphors, and Emotions to Inspire Action

torytelling is ancient, yet ever-evolving. It's a bridge connecting disciplines, spanning the realms of psychology, culture, education, and communication. Ιt is intersectional by nature, crisscrossing fields of study and human experience.

It is not just an art; it is a science, a force. As a leader, you cannot escape its pull, nor should you try. A story doesn't just inform; it transforms. It strengthens memory because our brains are wired for it, hungry for rhythm, and structure, the meaning that a story provides. When information is woven into the fabric of a narrative, it finds a place to rest in our minds, to anchor itself.

Think of it like this: when you hear a list of facts, they are fleeting, in one ear and out the other. But when those same facts are crafted into a story, they become roots that are anchored into your memory. The more a story mirrors the structures already familiar to us, the emotions we've felt, the challenges we've faced, the easier it is to remember.

Once upon a time, there was a tale of an ogre and a most impudent child, a story as old as storytelling itself, yet one that continues to resonate. The tale spoke of respect and humility, values unearthed through the missteps of a wayward, undisciplined child. That child! restless, greedy, and utterly reckless served as both a warning and a mirror, reflecting a character we've all encountered, or perhaps harbored, in our own lives.

This narrative, like so many others, was carefully chosen to fit the moment, addressing the community's pressing concerns. But what gave these tales their enchanting power wasn't just the colorful characters or thrilling plots; it was the symphony of emotions they stirred. When good triumphed over evil, waves of joy swept through the audience, uniting them in celebration. And when the tale spotlighted a behavior that mirrored the shortcomings of one among them, the subtle critique was a catalyst. The collective discomfort, perhaps mingled with a bit of shame, spurred reflection. It nudged individuals and the community at large toward change, adopting values and practices that elevated them all.

These stories weren't just entertainment; they were emotional journeys, leaving indelible marks on those who listened. Each laugh, cheer, or moment of quiet introspection forged a deeper connection to the lesson. Truly, it was the art of feeling that made these tales unforgettable.

In many respects, the difficulties faced by contemporary leaders are similar to those faced by historical storytellers. They also need to engage their listeners, clarify difficult subjects, and motivate them to take action. They can also use the power of storytelling, just as the elders under the acacia tree.

November 10, On 1963, Malcolm X gave his renowned address on the "House Negro and the Field Negro" at a lecture organized by the campus NAACP chapter and the African Students Association of Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan. Using this analogy, he criticized Black accommodationism and emphasized the necessity for revolutionary transformation.

In Malcolm's hands, a 40minute lecture became an exhilarating journey that felt like mere moments. His narratives wove together current events with profound truths, each anecdote shining a light on prejudice and inequality. These stories resonated deeply, speaking to the universal human desires for autonomy, respect, and dignity. By grounding his message in shared struggles, Malcolm offered more than a h e offered critique; understanding. He guided his audience through the psychological toll of systemic racism and illuminated their power to challenge the barriers to Black liberation.

The tales he told, drawn from the fabric of everyday life, transcended mere words. They transformed into symbols of resilience and boundless possibility. Through these narratives, abstract ideals like

hope and change were no longer intangible; they became urgent, real, and deeply personal.

But why do such stories linger, stirring us to action long after they're told? The answer lies in the emotional grip they hold. They don't merely speak to the mind; they seize the heart. Neuroscience reveals that when emotions are stirred, be it laughter, sorrow, or hope; the brain's amygdala amplifies the memory-making process. A story that touches the soul becomes a part of us, a thread in the tapestry of our identity.

This is the magic of storytelling, especially in leadership. Stories evoke emotions that inspire, connect, and transform. They remind us that the most profound changes start not with facts alone, but with the feelings that drive us to act.

A policy memo might inform, but a story that stirs emotions can transform. Jacinda Ardern, the former Prime Minister of New Zealand, exemplified this during her handling of the Christchurch mosque shootings. Rather than solely relving on political rhetoric, she shared stories of the victims, humanizing the tragedy. Her compassion, woven into her words, united a grieving nation and inspired global admiration.

Metaphors are the silent workhorses storytelling. of Traditional African storytellers knew this well. To convey the weight of community responsibility, they might say, "A single bracelet does not jingle." Such vivid imagery distilled complex philosophies into digestible truths.

Traditional stories made complex philosophies accessible, and leaders today can follow suit. Policies and visions, often steeped in jargon and data, can alienate audiences. But wrapped in a story, they become relatable. A story can do more to humanize the issue than pages of statistics.

The greatest stories are shared, recounted, and lived rather than only told. These days, narratives are more than just spoken words; they have developed into dialogues that invite listeners to join in, contribute their voices, and become a part of the narrative. They align with bigger dreams, tying themselves to causes that matter, showing a commitment to something greater than the brand itself.
