Speaking during the signing, Prof. Andala commended KSG's efforts in capacity building and expressed strong confidence in the impact of this collaboration. "Through this Understanding, we agree to pursue cooperation in areas such as training, curriculum development, certification, conferences, workshops, capacity development opportunities, and information sharing. ### Kenya Takes Bold Step in Accrual Accounting

a move set to n public transform financial management in Kenya, the Public Sector Accounting Standards (PSASB),Board i n collaboration with the National Treasury, has fundamental launched а training program aimed at the accelerating country's transition from cash-based to accrual accounting.

The workshop, taking place the Kenya School at of Government (KSG) in Mombasa from March 24 to 28, 2025, brings together accountants from Ministries, Departments, and Agencies (MDAs) as well as County Internal Officers Chief (CCIOs).

Accrual accounting is set to revolutionize Kenya's public sector financial reporting by ensuring that transactions are recorded when they occur, rather than when cash is received or paid. According CPA Georgina Muchai, the Acting Chief Executive Officer of PSASB, this shift will eliminate long-standing challenges such as incomplete financial statements and unverified public assets.

"Public sector entities that report under the cash basis of accounting cannot recognize assets in their financial statements, as only cash transactions are recorded. While these assets may be

disclosed, their completeness and accuracy may not always be verifiable," she explained.

One of the most pressing financial challenges in Kenya has been the accumulation of pending bills. Under the current cash-based system, liabilities are often not recognized until payments are made, leading to delays and budgetary complications. The adoption of accrual accounting is expected to address this issue by ensuring that obligations are recorded as soon as they arise, thereby improving financial planning and resource allocation.

The transition to accrualbased financial reporting is a major step in aligning Kenya with the International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), a globally recognized framework for transparent and accountable financial m a n a g e m e n t . B y implementing the accrualbased reporting template, the government aims to enhance decision-making, strengthen fiscal discipline, and ensure better resource management.

"Accrual accounting provides a clearer picture of government finances, allowing for better long-term planning, improved public service delivery, and enhanced investor confidence," CPA Muchai noted.

Mr. Isaiah Omondi, the KSG Mombasa Acting Campus Deputy Director, emphasized the importance of capacitybuilding in financial reforms, noting that well-trained accountants are key to ensuring seamless

accrual-based expertise on reporting, enabling them to drive the implementation process within their respective institutions. The initiative government's reflects commitment to financial accountability, reducing fiscal inefficiencies, and bolstering economic growth.

With the transition gaining momentum, Kenya is well on its way to joining the ranks of nations that have successfully embraced accrual accounting, setting the stage for a more transparent and accountable public financial management system.
