# Honoring Rt. Hon. Raila Odinga

## A True Legacy of Leadership and Service

wave of grief has swept across Kenya following the passing of Rt. Hon Raila Amolo Odinga, the former Prime Minister and one of the longest serving political leaders in the history of Kenya.

Kenya stands united in mourning for a man who can best be described as an enigma, a revolutionalist, a statesman and an African giant.

Agwambo's vision, courage, and unyielding belief in justice helped define the nation's political journey. His passing is the culmination of a period of strength, reform, and unswerving pursuit of civil liberties. For more than four decades, Odinga was not just a political leader, he dared Kenyans to dream of a fairer and more accountable nation.

KSG Director General, Prof. Nura Mohammed, took a moment to reflect on the transition of a great man who has a cordial connection with the Kenya School of Government. "This week, we are mourning one of our leaders, the late Rt. Hon. Raila Odinga," said the DG. "He studied here, back when we were still the Kenya Institute of Administration, and completed the Senior Management Course in 1976."

Odinga's connection to the School was more than symbolic; it was foundational. His time at the institution expanded his understanding of governance, policy, and the delicate balance between power and public service. Those early lessons in statecraft and leadership ethics would later contribute to his lifelong philosophy that power must serve people, not the other way around - a belief he carried throughout his storied career, from the trenches of opposition to the corridors of government.

Among other engagements the late leader shared with the School was the Pan African Youth Convention, where he shared introspective conversations on governance, youth empowerment, and Africa's transformation. "Africa must help its youth harness their energy as a driving force for a better continent," he urged.

This November, he was to return to the Kenya School of Government for the Inter-Generational Dialogue Conference

— a forum dedicated to bridging generations in public service and shaping a shared vision for the future. The conference seeks to nurture inclusive leadership, inspire innovation and digitization, strengthen the public service brand, and prioritize mental health and well-being — all in alignment with Africa's Agenda 2063. At its heart, is a call to the youth: to rise, to participate, and to co-create the nation's destiny alongside those who came before them.

Although the image of Raila Amolo Odinga was political in nature and focused on reform, his

vision deeply intersected the School's mandate, being an institution that focuses on enhancing governance, leadership and service within the public sector. He believed that good governance was not only created by political will, but by ongoing professional growth of the public servants – a mission that drives KSG's work.

Beyond his political accomplishments, Raila Amolo Odinga stood out as a mentor and a proponent of leadership in serving the people. As the Nation reflects on his passing, it is clear that Odinga's influence

### Food Security Training by KSG for South Sudan

n October 15, 2025, the Kenya School of Government commenced a twoweek program on Agricultural Extension and Advisory Services and Food Security Alignments and Coordination for 15 officials from the Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security, Republic of South Sudan. The inaugural session was officially opened by Dr. Josephine Mwanzia, Senior Director Academic Affairs at KSG, who was joined by Dr. Rachel Ngesa, Director Learning and Development, FCPA Andrew Rori, Director Institute of Devolution Studies, and faculty members Dr. Alex Mirara and Ms. Fatma Amiyo.

Dr. Mwanzia noted that the program was inspired by the recognition that South Sudan's agricultural leaders already possess

the knowledge, experience, and determination needed to transform their sector. What is often required is a structured platform for reflection, knowledge exchange, and peer learning to strengthen leadership, coordination, and service delivery in food security programs.

South Sudan continues to face a fragile economic and food security situation, with the economy contracting sharply amid rising inflation and widespread poverty. Although agriculture supports more than 80 percent of the population, the sector remains underdeveloped due to conflict, limited access to and poor infrastructure. As a result, about 7.7 million people - over half the population—are facing acute food insecurity, while more than two million children under five are at risk of malnutrition. These challenges underscore the urgent need to strengthen agricultural systems, improve extension services, and promote sustainable food security interventions.

In this training, participants are exploring how technology and innovation can enhance agricultural extension and food security initiatives, with sessions emphasizing the use of digital tools, mobile platforms, and data-driven systems to improve farmer outreach, coordination, and productivity. They are also gaining practical insights into climate-smart practices and evidence-based policymaking, equipping them with the skills to design effective agricultural programs, strengthen institutional capacity, and foster sustainable transformation in South Sudan's agricultural sector.

### Empowering the Frontline: Stronger Workforce for Child Protection

the Southern Coastal Kenya School Government, Matuga Campus, CPA Carren Achieng' Ageng'o, Principal Secretary, State Department for Children Services, led a mission of hope as she officiated the Management of Child Protection Services Course - a flagship training program established to build the capacity of officers and partners working to protect Kenya's most vulnerable citizens: the children.

In her keynote address, PS Ageng'o delivered a powerful message - a blend of reflection, gratitude, and challenge reminding participants that child protection is not driven by passion or goodwill only; it demands knowledge, structure, and professional competence.

"Taking matters to court, implementing laws, or responding to cases requires sound understanding of the legal and policy frameworks guiding child protection," she said. "It

also requires adequate resourcing, and here, human resource is key. This training is about building that capacity."

For the participants — many of whom serve on the frontlines of child welfare — the PS painted a vivid picture of the evolving expectations within the State Department: one where professionalism, consistency, and continuous learning must stand as the defining hallmarks of public service.

## The Genesis of a Transformative Partnership

CPA Ageng'o traced the origins of the program back to 2019, when the Directorate of Children Services initiated collaboration with the School, supported by UNICEF, to develop a curriculum for child protection officers. The partnership was born from recognition that Kenya needed a unified approach to child welfare, one that standardizes

practice, strengthens accountability, and promotes excellence across the country.

Today, that collaboration has borne fruit - Over 400 practitioners have successfully completed the training, including 221 officers from the State Department and 217 practitioners from partner organizations. These include non-governmental organizations that complement government efforts, particularly in areas where human resource gaps persist.

## Towards a Competent Workforce:

One of the key outcomes of training this i s t h e standardization of child protection practice, promoting consistency in applying the law and managing cases involving children - a shared understanding that strengthens Kenya's capacity to protect children from neglect, abuse, and exploitation, while reinforcing the principles of fairness and justice enshrined in the Constitution and the Children Act. "We shall make this training mandatory for all staff," the PS announced. "Within the State Department, this course will be a requirement. It will ensure that every child officer is empowered to serve effectively."

The PS expressed heartfelt appreciation to UNICEF, describing the organization as a steadfast ally in the journey toward child protection reform. "UNICEF remains our major partner," she said. "We have been able to train hundreds of officers across the country. We sincerely appreciate this continued

partnership." She also extended gratitude to her management team for meticulous coordination in selecting participants. The selection process requires thoughtful balancing to ensure representation across regions.

he Kenya School of Government (KSG), in partnership with the Huduma Kenya Secretariat, conducted a Training of Trainers (ToT) workshop on Customer Service Excellence (CSE) at the Lower Kabete Campus. The training was developed to strengthen facilitators knowledge and skills in championing a citizen driven service culture across government institutions.

Prof. Nura Mohamed, KSG Director General emphasized that customer service excellence is central to achieving Kenya's BETA Transformation Agenda. He urged participants to prioritize empathy, accountability, and continuous improvement in addressing taxpayer concerns. Prof. Mohamed also highlighted the growing collaboration between KSG and Huduma Kenya, which

will soon see KSG services integrated into Huduma Centres to enhance citizen access.

Ms. Susan Chesang, Head of Centre for CSE, guided the workshop reminding participants that every public officer embodies the government's image in the eyes

of the citizen. She urged them to "walk the talk" as true ambassadors of service excellence — upholding the highest standards of dignity, respect, and fairness in every interaction, and translating these values into the daily practice of public service.

The workshop covered key

themes including:

- The Customer Service Excellence Framework and its role in the national development agenda.
- Customer Centricity and lessons from the Huduma Kenya Experience in transforming mindsets and service culture.
- Quality Service Standards and creating enabling environments for excellence.
- Principles of Adult Learning,

effective facilitation, and evaluation techniques.

Facilitators were drawn from across KSG campuses — Lower Kabete and Embu — and from Huduma Kenya Secretariat, bringing together both theoretical and practical perspectives.

The training adopted participatory and experiential learning methods including group discussions, case studies, and simulations. Participants explored emotional intelligence,

service recovery, and internal culture transformation as critical elements for achieving lasting change in public service.

Key outcomes included strengthened facilitation skills, improved understanding of the Huduma Kenya DNA, and commitment to standardizing service quality across MDAs. The session also emphasized the "Wanjiku as the Employer" concept, reinforcing the idea that citizens are the true stakeholders of government service.

In the closing session, Ms. Chesang and the class representative, Ms. Hellen Magolo, led a debrief emphasizing the collective responsibility of trainers to cascade the CSE values throughout the public service.

The workshop concluded with renewed commitment to embedding Customer Service Excellence as a pillar of Kenya's public service transformation — ensuring that all citizens experience dignified, efficient, and responsive service at every point of contact.

d d r e s s i n g participants of the Senior Management
Course Cohort 206/2025 at KSG's, Mombasa Campus, Director Dr.
Rukia Atikiya delivered a message that struck at the heart of what true leadership means: grounded leadership, respect, and a deep sense of public duty.

Dr. Atikiya challenged conventional ideas of authority and hierarchy; "Respect everybody, across the board. Regardless of your role, we all contribute to the realization of the institution's vision," she said.

Her words echoed a rare humility in leadership, one that calls for empathy. "Nobody is complete without the other. Any loose chain in between affects not just individual performance, but that of the institution and even the nation," she added.

She returned to the recurring theme of time. "Everything at its own time. Support others when it is their time, and wait for yours. What matters is the impact you create while serving," she noted.

Her reflections took a personal turn when she asked the participants to think deeply about the imprints they wish to leave behind. To illustrate her point, she shared a story of a professor whose death was met with celebration by students. "What kind of impact have you created for people to celebrate your death?" she asked. "Be the kind of leader whose absence echoes through the lives you've touched, for what you awakened

in others."

Speaking passionately about aligning personal roles to institutional vision, she quoted U.S. President John F. Kennedy's moon-landing vision, recounting how even a cleaner at NASA saw his role as contributing to that mission. "That," she said, "is alignment, when everyone, regardless of role, connects their daily tasks to a collective vision."

Beyond the philosophy of leadership, Dr. Atikiya encouraged practical growth. Programs such as the Leadership for National Transformation course which is developed through a collaboration between Kenya, Ireland, and France is intended to strengthen leadership competencies for national progress. These programs and more, encourage interaction and clarity of your issues changing the narrative of the public service.

In an age where leadership is too often mistaken for position or power, Dr. Atikiya reminded the audience that its true essence lies in character, empathy, and the mark one leaves on others.

### KAPAM Webinar on the Era of Automation

he Kenya Association of Public Administration & Management (KAPAM) hosted its first annual webinar for 2025 titled 'Harnessing Innovation for Effective Public Service Delivery in the Era of Digital Transformation'. The webinar held on October 15, 2025 was facilitated by Mr Michael Michie, a technology entrepreneur working on AI infrastructure development and AI safety standards globally. The webinar explored (1) strategies to make public services simpler, faster, and fairer through citizen-centred design, (2) identified the digital foundations (data, infrastructure, governance) that make innovations stick, and (3) examined practical, responsible uses of AI in government and the guardrails they require.

Mr. Michie noted that digital transformation goes beyond basic digitization or task automation but toward "digital public intelligence," using data and interoperable workflows to drive better decision making. He emphasized the need for citizencentered services that prioritize real-use case, accessibility, and usability—making online processes simpler than their inperson equivalents and ensuring persons with disabilities can fully access services

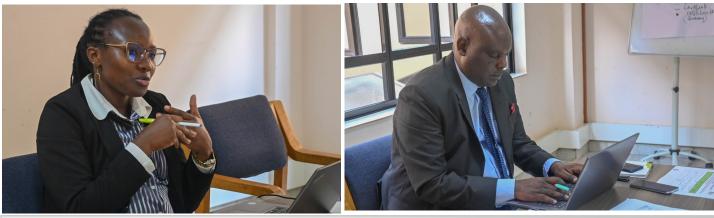
The session also discussed organizational readiness and responsible AI with participants exploring change management, the fast-evolving AI ecosystem, and practical ways to evaluate innovations/solutions. Michie highlighted model-quality metrics such as F1, ROC-AUC, precision@K, MRR and proposed a simple "VALID AI" check covering data, algorithms, human-in-the-loop, legal/ethical issues, interpretability, bias/diversity, and accuracy as a pragmatic governance tool to safeguard use of AI.

The webinar, is inline with KAPAM 2025 theme of ICT in public service delivery.

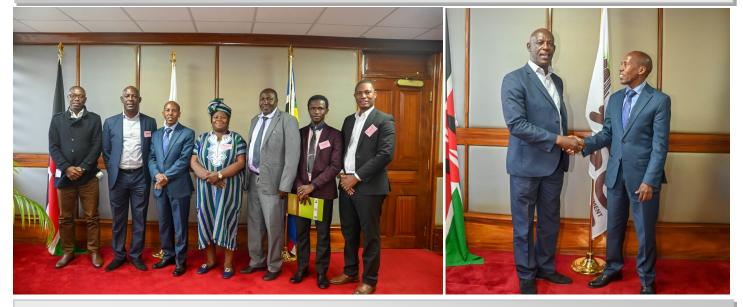

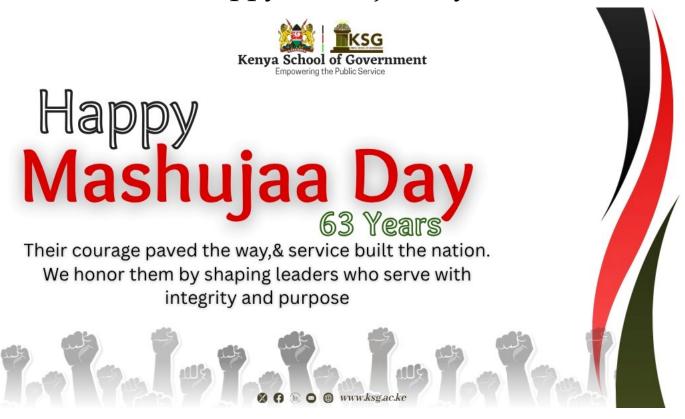

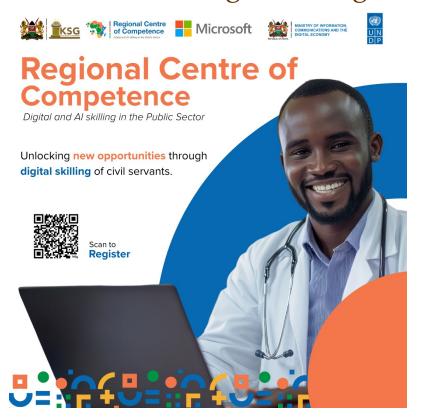
