Cyber Week Africa 2025: Shaping a Secure Digital Future

he 2025 edition of Cyber Week Africa came to a close at the Kenya School of Government (KSG), Lower Kabete, after five days of engaging dialogue, collaboration, and innovation guided by the theme 'Compliance by Design: Securing Africa's Digital Future'.

The conference, which drew delegates from more than 90 countries, once again affirmed its Africa's place as premier platform for advancing cybersecurity and artificial intelligence (AI). Over the course of the week, policymakers, innovators, scholars, industry leaders exchanged insights on how Africa can build a secure and resilient digital ecosystem capable of powering sustainable growth in the digital

Hosted by KSG in partnership with the Ministry of Information, Communications and the Digital Economy, the National Computer and Cybercrimes

Coordination Committee (NC4), CyberPro Global, and Huawei, the summit underscored the need for collaboration between government, academia, and the private sector to safeguard Africa's digital space.

At the opening ceremony, Cabinet Secretary for Information, Communications and the Digital Economy, Hon. William Kabogo Gitau, stated that cybersecurity has become central to Kenya's economic and governance agenda, describing it as both a pillar of national

sovereignty and an enabler of economic growth. The CS amplified the significance of the conference's theme, noting that Compliance by Design reflected a paradigm shift toward embedding security, privacy, and accountability into the design of digital systems from the very beginning.

Throughout the week, delegates explored practical solutions to emerging cyber threats such as data theft, phishing, ransomware, and AIdriven intrusions. CS Kabogo reaffirmed the government's resolve to strengthen the country's defenses through enhanced policy frameworks and cross-sector partnerships. "Africa has what it takes to build an advanced digital ecosystem with impactful digital sovereignty, prioritizing cybersecurity as a central pillar of development," he remarked.

The private sector, too, played a vital role in this dialogue. Mr. Samuel Cheng, Managing Director of Huawei Kenya, reiterated the company's dedication to secure and future-ready digital systems. He explained that Huawei continued to invest in developing cutting-edge network security solutions and building local

capacity.

As part of this commitment, Huawei celebrated the graduation of 40 government officers who had successfully completed advanced network security training, in Mr. Cheng's words, that reflected tangible progress in enhancing Kenya's cybersecurity talent pool.

Prof. Nura Mohamed, Director General, Kenya School of Government, outlined KSG's ongoing role in steering digital transformation across public institutions. He spoke of the establishment of the Regional Center of Competence for Digital Skilling, which he described as a cornerstone for advancing AI, digital literacy, and cybersecurity capacity building across the continent. "We are bringing together all stakeholders to drive the cybersecurity and artificial intelligence agenda, especially in the public sector," he said in regard to KSG's pivotal contribution to the region's digital future. The DG urged partners to support digital empowerment efforts through expanded access to infrastructure, aligning with Kenya's Transformation Agenda.

The conference also featured

international strong participation, reflecting the global nature of cybersecurity challenges. H.E. Gideon Behar, Ambassador of Israel to Kenya, said that no country could achieve digital progress without cvbersecurity strong foundation. Amb. reaffirmed Israel's readiness to support Kenya's vision of becoming a regional hub for digital innovation and invited delegates to attend Cyber Week Israel 2025 in Tel Aviv, echoing the value of continued global cooperation.

Similarly, H.E. Maroš Mitrík,

Ambassador of Slovakia to Kenya, described cybersecurity as not merely a national issue but a global imperative. He acknowledged Kenya's strides in digital innovation and shared Slovakia's digital education initiative, which had trained over 4,000 teachers in Machakos County, strengthening digital literacy at the grassroots level.

As Cyber Week Africa 2025 concluded, it left behind a renewed sense of purpose and unity among delegates defined as a shared recognition that Africa's digital progress depends on collective vigilance, innovation, and trust- a dialogue that reassured Kenya's leadership in championing secure, inclusive, and innovation-driven digital governance.

Delegates reflected on a singular truth that is; the continent's digital future must be secured by design, guided by collaboration, and sustained through continuous learning. Cyber Week Africa 2025 ended on a high note as a defining step toward building a safer, smarter, and more resilient digital Africa.

enya asserted its continental leadership climate governance during the Climate Action Summit 2025, held from October 28th to 31st at the Kenva School of Government, Lower Kabete. Convened under the theme 'Institutionalizing Climate Action in Kenya: Policy Alignment, Leadership Coordination, and Localized Implementation,' the summit brought together diverse delegates from national and county governments, civil society, academia, youth and women's networks, private sector, and development partners.

At the Summit, Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Forestry, Dr. Deborah Barasa, spelled out Kenya's unwavering commitment to strengthening climate governance and advancing the vision of the Nairobi Declaration. She reckoned that the Summit played a significant role in aligning

national efforts with global climate priorities while promoting sustainable innovation that drives inclusive growth. In a symbolic gesture of environmental stewardship, Dr. Barasa planted a tree laying out government's dedication for a greener future for generations to come

In his keynote address Vihiga County Governor H.E. Dr. Wilberforce Otichilo brought out the value of mainstream climate change into all levels of governance, its widespread impact across communities and government sectors. He voiced the Council of Governors commitment to building adaptive capacity and driving progress toward the Sustainable Development Goals, continued collaboration for a climate-ready future.

Prof. Nura Mohamed, KSG Director General acknowledged the collaborative efforts behind the Summit, pointing out that such partnerships are already transforming ecosystems and governance systems across the country. He described the gathering as a legacy moment and a commitment for sustainable change positioning Kenya as a global model of climate leadership on the Road to COP30.

While lending her remarks at Summit, Nairobi Rivers Commission Chairperson Hon. Bishop Margaret Wanjiru termed the Nairobi River Basin as a powerful symbol transformation from years of neglect to renewed vision. She expounded that the Commission is spearheading one of Kenya's most ambitious restoration and urban renewal efforts, upgrading sewer systems, creating green spaces, and harmonizing housing and sanitation needs with ecological restoration.

Kenya's climate governance framework has long been recognized as among the most progressive in Africa. Anchored in the Climate Change Act (2016) and guided by the country's Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), Kenya has continuously advanced policies that blend climate ambition with

development priorities. The country's successful hosting of the 2023 Africa Climate Summit (ACS) and the adoption of the Nairobi Declaration served as critical milestones that called for Africa to move from high-level pledges to decisive implementation.

Building on this momentum, the 2025 Summit was conceived as a catalytic platform to close the gap between policy and practice. strengthen It sought to intergovernmental coordination, enhance institutional capacity, and embed accountability across all levels of governance. The discussions called for aligning devolved climate action with national priorities such as Vision 2030 and the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), ensuring that climate initiatives meaningfully contribute to Kenya's long-term sustainable development.

Delegates discussed the need for stronger collaboration among public, private, and community actors to unlock Kenya's potential for green growth

through renewable energy transitions, sustainable mobility, and nature-based solutions. The vouth were celebrated as vital agents change driving innovation and awareness in the country's low-carbon journey. Women leaders, too, were recognized for their indispensable role in shaping inclusive and equitable climate governance at both national and county levels.

As the Summit concluded, the spirit of urgency and solidarity was reawakened among delegates. The collective message had been made clear in that climate action is no longer optional but very much essential for Kenya's prosperity and survival. The delegates resolved to champion partnerships that empower communities, foster accountability, and promote science-informed, peoplecentered solutions.

As a result, Kenya now moves forward to COP30 in Belém, Brazil, with strengthened resolve and unity of purpose ready to showcase tangible progress and restructure its place as a continental trailblazer in climate governance.

Climate Action 2025 was privileged to feature a distinguished array of facilitators, including Dr. George Lutomia from Kippra, Hon. Justice Oscar Amugo Angote, Hon. Senator Faki Mohammed, Senator for Mombasa, NGAAF CEO Roy Sasaka, Dr. Charles Karisa (NRC), and Dr. Tobias Omufwoko (WASH Alliance) amongst many others.

The Summit benefited greatly from KSG's team of skilled facilitators and dedicated organizers, including Mr. Andrew Rori, Director of the Institute of Devolution Studies, Dr. Anthony Kamakia- Head of Centre for Environment, Research fellows - Ms. Eunice Weveti and Ms. Pauline Bala, and Mr. Peter Quest- Head Business Development, and Resource Innovation Mobilization.

ToT on Public Health Module for Leadership Program

he Kenya School of Government (KSG), collaboration with the Institut National du Service Public (INSP), hosted a five-day Training of Trainers Workshop on the Public Health Module under the Leadership Program for National Transformation (LPNT) from 27th to 31st October 2025 at the KSG Embu Campus.

The workshop aimed to equip KSG faculty members with enhanced knowledge, facilitation skills, and a transformative mindset to effectively build competencies required for implementing public health reforms within Kenya's decentralized governance framework. It emphasized the integration of leadership and health policy for national transformation, focusing competency-based learning, innovation, and collaborative delivery.

Speaking during the opening session, workshop the coordinator, Mr. Gerard Wandera and Embu Campus Deputy Director, Dr. Frederick Mukabi outlined the objectives of the program, emphasizing the strategic alignment of the LPNT with Kenya's national reform agenda. Ms. Emmanuelle Lewis and Ms. Sandra Collin from INSP presented an overview of the latest curriculum updates and methodologies, as they guided participants through conceptualization of the Public

Health Module and the design of pedagogical activities.

Throughout the week, participants engaged interactive plenary and working group sessions, exploring practical exercises, case studies, and scenario-based simulations. The workshop was structured around three specialized working groups; Building Practical Exercises, Public Health Module Design, and Developing Pedagogical Activities.

These groups worked collaboratively to refine teaching models, integrate adult learning principles, and develop tailormade exercises reflecting realworld public health policy challenges. Deep-dive sessions covered advanced facilitation skills, curriculum innovation, and strategies for enhancing inter-institutional coordination in health sector transformation.

The training also featured presentations of group outcomes, where participants showcased draft modules, proposed improvements, and

innovative teaching methodologies. Constructive feedback sessions provided a platform for peer learning and refinement of training materials. The week's events highlighted KSG's ongoing commitment to strengthening Kenya's public service training architecture and fostering cross-sectoral transformation.

Program administration was led by Ms. Doreen Chebet, supported by coordinators Mr. Gerard Wandera and Dr. Prisca Oluoch, and tech support and rapporteur services were provided by Mr. Paul Nderitu.

The workshop reaffirmed KSG's position as a regional leader in building capacity for public sector excellence and advancing Kenya's agenda for sustainable transformation through knowledge, leadership, and innovation

PS Kimtai Urges Mining Officers to Strengthen Compliance

Principal h e Secretary, State Department for Mining, Mr. Harry Kimtai, graced CBS, Induction Program for County Executives at the Kenya School of Government (KSG), Mombasa Campus. The program brought together county mining officers from across the country to enhance their understanding of implementation, policy compliance, and service delivery in the mining sector.

The PS was received by Mr. D.B.O. Bob Gichana, a faculty member at the School, who welcomed him on behalf of the Campus Director. Mr. Kimtai commended KSG for its continued contribution to capacity building within the public sector, noting that such

programs are instrumental in equipping officers with the skills needed to implement the government's mining reforms effectively.

In an engaging and candid session with the county mining officers, Mr. Kimtai underscored the importance of stronger governance, compliance, and coordination between the national and county levels. He emphasized that counties are the foundation of Kenya's mining governance structure and must take a more proactive role in licensing, monitoring, and enforcing mining operations.

"I feel a serious disconnect between the counties and the national office. You went to the counties and disappeared. The impact has not been felt. We want to give you more power and greater responsibility because the future of mining begins at the county level," he said.

Mr. Kimtai explained that the Ministry plans to devolve more functions to counties, particularly in the early stages of licensing and in validating geological reports. "You are the base, the foundation," he noted. "Without your endorsement, a geological report should not proceed for national approval. Counties must own this process."

The PS expressed concern over weak communication and inconsistent reporting from the counties, observing that such gaps hinder effective planning and investment attraction. "When I call for reports, I expect clarity, who is operating legally, who is not, and what new opportunities exist in each county. Without accurate data, we cannot market our mineral potential or attract credible investors," he said.

Mr. Kimtai also highlighted the high cost of non-compliance

and litigation in the sector, noting that unresolved disputes stall economic growth. "Every time we end up in court over licensing issues, we lose valuable time and resources," he said. To address this, he announced the establishment of a Project Implementation Committee that will include county officers, geologists, and investors to ensure projects progress from licensing to actual field operations.

He urged officers to adhere to the Mining Act and related policies as their guiding framework. "That Act should be your Bible. When applied consistently, it enhances compliance, increases revenue, and promotes sustainable mining," he stated.

The PS concluded by calling

for stronger collaboration and accountability across all levels of mining administration. "The transformation of our mining sector begins with you. Be proactive, communicate effectively, and ensure that every license issued contributes to Kenya's economic growth," he told the officers.




