The popular African Proverb, *If you want to fast, go alone, if you want to go far, go together*, perfectly captures the spirit behind the collaborative initiatives made by the Kenya School of Government (KSG).

For KSG, partnerships are foundational to its evolution and influence, shaping the Schools growth and reach giving authority to the work it has done nationally and beyond.

This week, the School ratified a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Judicial Service Commission (JSC) - a significant step that aims to advance capacity

development within the Judiciary.

Chief Justice Hon. Martha Koome, who witnessed the signing of the MoU, said the agreement formally cements a relationship that has grown over the years aligning with the JSC's Constitutional mandate under Article 172, to promote and facilitate training and development of judicial officers and staff.

Through the years KSG has supported the Judiciary through programs, and hosted workshops upon request. This collaboration therefore brings greater clarity, intention and structure to the design and

implement of training programs for judges and judicial officers.

The training programs will be conducted through the Kenya Judiciary Academy (KJA) - the capacity development arm of the Judiciary of Kenya that contributes to the efficient administration of justice and the professional growth of officers within Kenya's justice system.

Commissioner Hon. Charity Kisotu in-charge of the Academy observed that as KJA continues to grow, it leverages the expertise within established institutions such as KSG renowned for building capacity across the public service spectrum – from induction of new entrants to executive leadership programs. "This partnership offers structured mentorship and technical support, ensuring that judicial officers and staff benefit from high-quality training grounded in proven public sector expertise," she said.

KSG Director General, Prof. Nura Mohamed expressed readiness of the School to extend beyond the signing of the MoU to

actualizing initiatives where the officials are set to gain from co-creating programs and events to unlocking the expertise within KSG's specialized institutes and centres - possibilities are expansive for innovation and excellence.

He added that study visits, expert exchanges, and knowledge-sharing platforms would enable both KSG and JSC advance strategic foresight and shape a futuristic public service.

The MoU must move beyond symbolism. It must deliberately grow young leaders, and reshape institutional culture. Programs should be paired with meaningful incentives – linked to career progression, recognition, or performance frameworks so that participation is seen more as opportunity of growth than as compliance. This is how the partnership will become transformative, not transactional.

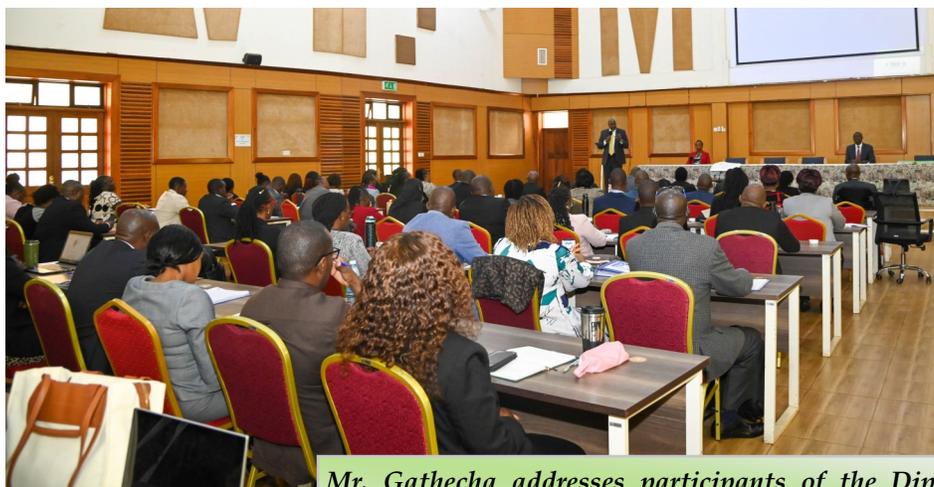

Mombasa & Matuga Usher in New Leadership

On 22nd and 23rd February 2026, Director General of the Kenya School of Government, Prof. Nura Mohamed, presided over coordinated leadership inaugurations at the School's Mombasa and Matuga campuses, respectively, signaling continued institutional strengthening, strategic continuity, and governance across the School's campuses. .

In Mombasa, the ceremony formally marked leadership transition from Dr. Rukia Atikiya and the installation of Dr. Fredrick Mukabi as Campus Director, alongside Dr. David Sergon as Deputy Director. During Dr. Atikiya's tenure, the Campus recorded sustained revenue growth, strengthened debt recovery systems, and expanded its regional footprint through program delivery in South Sudan and Somalia. Academic innovation also advanced through the development of new curricula in urban climate resilience in collaboration with international partners positioned the Campus

among top performers within the KSG system.

Dr. Mukabi on the other hand assumes leadership with nearly two decades of institutional experience, most recently serving as Deputy Director at the Embu Campus. As he inherits a campus on a strong trajectory he outlines priorities on building faculty capacity, elevating staff welfare, and consolidating alignment with the School's broader strategic framework.

The Director General emphasized leadership as both institutional stewardship and human-centered service grounded on character, responsibility, and measurable impact.

At the South Coast at the Matuga Campus, Prof. Mohamed presided over the inauguration of Mr. Dennis Marube as Deputy Director during an occasion that convened senior management and staff, united by a sense of purpose and optimism for the Campus's future.

In his remarks, Prof.

Mohamed set the tone with a message anchored in leadership philosophy, professional growth, and legacy building. Introducing Mr. Marube, he painted a compelling portrait of a public servant whose career progression exemplifies resilience, competence, and dedication.

With over twenty-two years of experience in public service, Mr. Marube's journey from research assistant to Deputy Director is a testament to sustained performance, institutional knowledge, and leadership maturity. Prof. Mohamed further challenged leaders to make their chapter "melodious, beautiful, and memorable," where their vision will ultimately be measured by human impact.

Complementing these reflections, senior directors present reinforced themes of synergy, standards, and institutional ambition. Dr. Tom Wanyama (Finance and Administration) called for collective responsibility and adherence to standards urging

The Kenya School of Government, eLearning & Information Technology Institute (eLITI) hosted a highly engaging Cyber Security Training Programme at the Regional Centre of Competence, bringing together 24 officers from across the Public Service including ICT officers from KSG campuses.

The five-day program immersed participants in critical areas such as cybersecurity fundamentals, threat detection and prevention, hacker methodology, cyber resilience, incident response, business continuity, and the regulatory framework governing cybersecurity in Kenya.

In an era where digital systems form the backbone of public service, cybersecurity is no longer optional—it is essential. The sessions offered practical insights into safeguarding government systems, understanding the evolving threat landscape, and strengthening organizational readiness against cyber incidents.

Deputy Director Ms. Vera Obonyo in her closing remarks emphasized the importance of data in today's organizations, stating that data is a critical national asset as well as a potential risk if not properly safeguarded. She called on participants to champion inclusion of cybersecurity as an agenda item in departmental meetings to underscore its relevance and importance. Cyber security requires inter-departmental and inter-agency coordination to be effective.

Course coordinator, Mr. Timothy Kisinga, encouraged participants to build a culture of vigilance and cyber responsibility and collectively safeguard the integrity, continuity, and resilience of organizational data and operations.

Class president Ryan Masheti said that the enthusiasm and commitment shown by the participants was a powerful reminder that securing public institutions begins with empowering the staff.

As cyber threats continue to grow in frequency and sophistication, the call to action is clear: Everyone has a role to play, and awareness is our strongest defence.

Disability Inclusion - A necessity not charity!

Most people think disability inclusion is about building ramps and reserving parking spaces; it is time to rethink that notion.

A recently concluded 3-Day Disability Inclusion training, organized by the National Council for Persons with Disabilities (NCPWD), highlighted the need to have all state entities be accessible to Persons with Disabilities (PWDs).

The new Act (Persons with Disabilities 2025), laid the basis for the training that took place from 3rd to 5th February, 2026. The training convened public officers across Kenya to deepen understanding of disability inclusion and integration into public service. The new Act places a huge responsibility on institutions to embed accessibility as a standard practice within all offices. I attended this training alongside my colleagues in the KSG Disability Mainstreaming Committee, and it was one of the most enlightening capacity-building sessions I have participated in.

The Act broadens the definition of disability to include physical, mental, intellectual, sensory, and psychosocial conditions. It protects the rights to housing, work, healthcare, education, political participation, and access to the legal system. Additionally, it offers particular safeguards for women and children living with disabilities.

I was totally struck by one statistic. A significant percentage of our population is made up of PWDs who confront several barriers daily that most of us are completely unaware of. These barriers range from inaccessible

buildings, websites that are inaccessible to screen readers, and information that is just not in a format that they can utilize. The issue here is not ignorance, rather it is about structures, mindsets, and processes that are discriminatory and oblivious to the differently abled. This therefore requires legal mechanisms to fix these structural barriers that prevent PWDs from fully participating socially, economically or even politically.

Under the new Act, it is a requirement is that any employer with at least 20 or more staff must ensure that at least 5% of them PWDs. However, to hire PWDs, the employer must make reasonable accommodations that allow for accessibility and usability of a PWD to work. These include assistive technology, flexible working hours, or modified infrastructure.

Implications for non-compliance are significant. Human resource departments should carry out audits on their current workforce composition, review recruitment policies, remove barriers, and actively seek

qualified candidates with disabilities. Furthermore, it means rethinking the definition of "qualified", because the barriers may disqualify an applicant when, for instance, the interview location is inaccessible, or the application procedure is not legible, or onboarding materials are not usable to the differently abled.

Accessibility is now mandatory. NCPWD has the power to conduct audits and issue adjustment orders for reasonable accommodations. For inaccessible buildings, transport, or ICT systems, institutions can be compelled to change them to meet the required standards. Failure to comply comes with penalties of either jail time or fines up to Ksh. 2 million.

Indeed, the government has made it desirable to do the right thing - Paying employees with impairments can result in a 25% tax deduction for employers and an additional 50% deduction for accessibility improvements.

On the last day, each entity was guided on how to develop an institutional action plan for specific infrastructure modifications that can be

accomplished in the short term or long term.

To achieve these institutional action plans, every MDAC is required by the Head of Public Service Circular to constitute a Disability Mainstreaming Unit (DMU), with a Disability Mainstreaming Officer, and a Disability Mainstreaming Action Plan. The DMUs serve as focal points for the coordination of disability-related initiatives, monitoring progress, and ensuring compliance with the required standards.

Throughout the training, one message stood out clearly: inclusion requires commitment, collaboration, and continuous learning. It was a reminder that behind every statistic is a person:

a colleague who cannot access the office lift; a citizen who cannot read a government notice, or a job applicant who never gets called for an interview – not because they lack skill, but because the system was never designed with them in mind. That citizen could be you or me, because disability is a club that any of us could end up joining as a result of an accident or illness that leaves one differently abled.

Disability inclusion is about building a public service that truly serves everyone. KSG's Institute of Gender and Social Development will be partnering with the National Council for Persons with Disabilities to train public servants on Disability Mainstreaming for compliance.

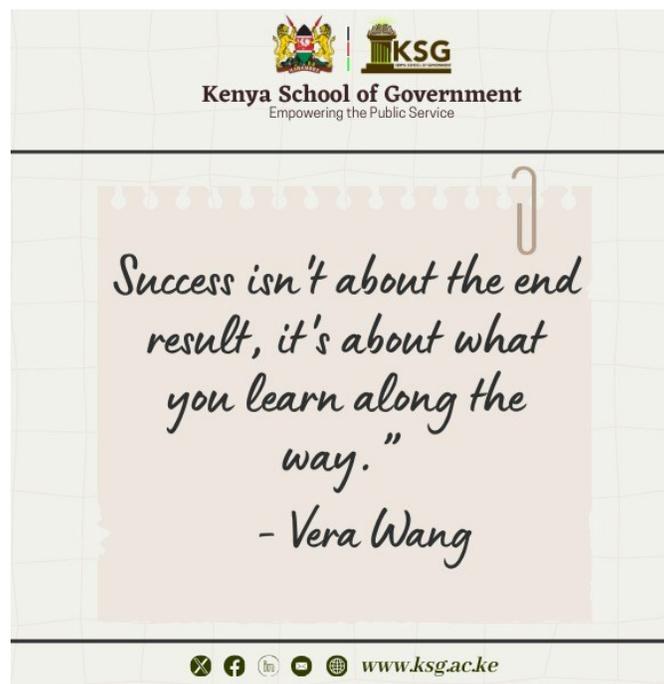
