It was a momentous occasion on Wednesday, May 20, 2026, when the Kenya School of Government launched the onboarding of its services on to the Huduma Kenya Secretariat platforms.

KSG joins other institutions that are intentionally making strides in creating remarkable and commendable customer experiences through performing on the spot services. Gone are the

days when citizens had to navigate complex bureaucratic processes. Now, it is about bringing government to the people – faster, simpler, closer, and exactly where citizens need it most.

At the launch, which was held in Eldoret, Uasin Gishu County, Prof. Nura Mohamed, KSG Director General and CPA Ben Kai Chilumo at the helm of Huduma Kenya Secretariat,

signed off on a partnership whose foundation had been laid long before this formal unveiling.

Experience and innovation must deliberately converge to align with citizens' growing expectations for convenience. As such, KSG, globally renowned for its expertise in capacity development for an array of stakeholders, is quite in order to team up with Huduma Kenya

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Secretariat, an award-winning institution celebrated for having the most efficient one-stop shops countrywide.

For Prof. Nura Mohamed, the onboarding is particularly important to him as he prioritizes citizens at the grassroots level, who now should be able to access training programmes for all cadres within their localities. Indeed no one is left behind – the youth, private sector players, and other groups are all taken care of in this project.

He adds that the expansion reflects the School's evolving mandate beyond public service training to broader capacity development and citizen engagement.

On the other hand, CPA Ben Chilumo affirmed that through the trained Huduma Universal Agents serving as frontline officers, citizens are guaranteed a more guided, reassuring, and seamless experience as they apply for training or seek other services from KSG. This breathes new

relevance into the already established Huduma infrastructure.

Amongst staff members at the ceremony, were Uasin Gishu County Commissioner Dr. Edison Nyale and KSG Baringo Campus Director Dr. Wesley Kiprop, marking the formal rollout after months of consultation, systems integration, and induction

training for the Agents who will support delivery of the services across the selected centers.

What is expected from this rollout? It redefines how citizens and public officers interact with Government learning and services – by shrinking distance, collapsing bureaucracies and taking opportunity closer to the people. For many Kenyans, reach to KSG programmes will no longer be tied to costly logistics.

The partnership also comes at a time when institutions must embrace digital systems and integrated operations to advance hustle-free public access and responsive governance.

As KSG celebrates 100 years since its establishment in July this year, this alliance with Huduma Kenya signals renewed focus on modernization of operations for the benefit of the citizen. It is the meeting point of knowledge, technology, and proximity – where public service becomes more present in everyday life, not distant or occasional.

KSG Participates in STRI4Society Week 2026



This week at the KICC: leaders, researchers, innovators and young people advance conversations on the future of science, research and innovation in Kenya.

The Kenya School of Government (KSG) participated in the Science, Technology, Research and Innovation for Society (STRI4Society) Week 2026 held from 18th–22nd May 2026 at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC), Nairobi.

The national event was organized by the National Commission for Science, Technology and Innovation (NACOSTI) in collaboration with the State Department for Science, Research and Innovation as a platform to advance Kenya's science, technology, research, and innovation ecosystem.

Held under the theme "Igniting Innovation: Bridging Science and Society for Sustainable Development," the forum brought together government institutions,

academia, industry, innovators, startups, development partners, investors, and researchers to showcase research outputs, strengthen policy engagement, accelerate commercialization, and promote industry linkages and investment opportunities.

Discussions delved on strategic areas including digital transformation, emerging technologies, climate innovation, research commercialization, STEM education, and industry-academia-government collaboration aimed at advancing socio-economic transformation and sustainable national development.

The event was officially opened by Prof. Shaukat Abdulrazak, EBS, Principal Secretary for Science, Research and Innovation, alongside H.E. Vincenzo Del Monaco, Ambassador of Italy to Kenya, and H.E. Henriette Geiger,

Ambassador of the European Union to Kenya. Their participation underscored the growing importance of international collaboration, innovation diplomacy, and strategic partnerships in advancing Kenya's research and innovation agenda.

Representing KSG, Dr. Tawfiq Bashir, Deputy Director, Embu Campus, participated in technical sessions, exhibitions, and stakeholder engagements focusing on research-policy linkages, innovation ecosystems, digital transformation, artificial intelligence, and emerging technologies within the public sector.

Dr. Tawfiq also attended as a special guest in a key side event themed "Strengthening Research and Policy Linkage in Kenya's Research Ecosystem," which highlighted the need for stronger collaboration among researchers,

academic institutions, policymakers, and the public in advancing evidence-informed policymaking and national development. The session emphasized the importance of translating research into actionable policy and strengthening institutional partnerships to support effective governance and sustainable development.

KSG's participation in STRI4Society Week 2026 provided an opportunity to strengthen engagement with national and international stakeholders on emerging trends shaping governance, leadership

The engagements further opened avenues for collaboration in research, capacity building, innovation policy, and strategic partnerships aligned with KSG's mandate of strengthening public sector capability and promoting evidence-based governance. The participation also reaffirmed the School's commitment to advancing innovation-driven public sector transformation, digital governance, leadership development, and knowledge-based solutions for national development.

Changing Culture at the National Research Conversation

The Kenya School of Government continues to strengthen its core mandate of research by promoting evidence-based dialogue aimed at transforming public governance and institutional culture in Kenya.

This commitment was demonstrated during the National Research Conference held on May 20–21, 2026 at the Kenya School of Government Lower Kabete Campus under the theme “Re-Imagining Public Governance and Culture.” At the forum were plenary members comprising scholars, researchers, public servants, and institutional leaders drawn from across government

and partner institutions to interrogate governance challenges, share research findings, and explore practical, evidence-based solutions for strengthening public service delivery and institutional accountability.

Dr. Josephine Mwanzia, Senior Director Academic Affairs, described it as a significant achievement that has opened new opportunities for innovation, partnerships, and collaboration with Ministries, Departments, and Agencies (MDAs).

She further highlighted the importance of stakeholder engagement throughout the research process, and increased production of reports, manuscripts, journals, and policy briefs to strengthen the School's

research mandate.

The Schools advisory role is firmly anchored in research, as findings and recommendations provide a clear reflection of governance realities while also offering practical, evidence-based solutions to policy and institutional challenges. She explained.

Dr. Rachel Ngesa, Director Institute of Devolution Studies, while officiating the opening of the conference, challenged plenary to rethink the concept of “re-imagining” through lens of redesigning, refocusing, recreating, and review.

She further noted that meaningful reform in governance systems requires openness to new ideas, reflective practice, and

sustained commitment to evidence-based improvement across institutions.

Dr. Tawfiq Bashir Deputy Director Embu Campus and Dr. Joseph Ndung'u , Deputy Director Research, Consultancy and Advisory services added their voices to the forum; emphasizing the importance of disseminating research as a critical link between knowledge generation and practical application; and ensuring that findings inform policy action, institutional reform, and improved public service delivery.

A key highlight of the conference was the presentation of ten research papers organized under thematic areas focusing on digital transformation, governance, accountability, ethical leadership, and public sector reform.

The studies explored emerging issues affecting institutional performance and service delivery, including the adoption of Artificial Intelligence in state corporations, the role of digital technologies in

accountability in agricultural governance, and the influence of policy awareness and capacity building on citizen participation.

Other presentations examined ethical leadership and integrity in institutions, stakeholder participation in school governance, equitable healthcare service delivery, climate action governance, workplace culture in the public sector, and integrity in national and human security governance.

Presenters highlighted the importance of strengthening institutional frameworks, enhancing accountability systems, promoting inclusive leadership, and investing in innovation, research, and capacity building to support effective governance and sustainable public sector transformation in Kenya.

During plenary, and discussant engagements, the Conference generated outcomes to build research practice and institutional effectiveness.

A key resolution emerged on promotion of action-oriented research that prioritizes practical, policy-relevant solutions capable of informing public sector reforms and improving governance outcomes.

According to delegates, research must increasingly move beyond academic output to directly influence decision-making and institutional performance.

The conference also stressed enhancement of methodological rigor in research design and analysis. This involves clarity of variables, improving analytical depth, and ensuring that studies generate robust and credible evidence capable of addressing complex governance challenges.

Additionally, improving the quality and coherence of research outputs by securing alignment between research papers, policy briefs, and dissemination products would enhance usability and policy uptake.

It further reflected the

resilience and adaptive capacity of the School. What initially appeared to be a standard academic exercise evolved into a highly productive 1½-day engagement that significantly enhanced institutional learning, collaboration, and professional exchange among plenary members.

The process also generated important learning points, with several approaches tested during the conference now set to be refined and integrated into future Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for improved efficiency in research

dissemination.

Looking ahead, the Taskforce would consolidate lessons learned, treating the conference as a pilot for future national research engagements.

A structured national research conference calendar would be developed to institutionalize consistency and coordination in research dissemination. The draft Research Policy and Guidelines will be finalized, approved, and to guide institutional research practice across the School.

The School, Huawei Kenya's Plan for Digital Distinction

The Kenya School of Government and Huawei Kenya have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to strengthen ICT infrastructure, digital transformation, and technology-enabled learning across KSG campuses. The agreement was signed at the Lower Kabete Campus by KSG Director General Prof. Nura Mohamed and Huawei Kenya Deputy CEO James Sun Quan.

The partnership provides a framework for cooperation to improve public-sector service delivery through enhanced digital competencies, knowledge sharing, and joint capacity-building initiatives. The collaboration also supports Kenya's broader digital transformation agenda and the modernization of government services.

Speaking during the signing ceremony, Prof. Mohamed described Huawei Kenya as a globally recognized technology leader distinguished by innovation and investment in research and development.

He explained KSG's decision to partner with the company followed a visit to Huawei headquarters, where the School gained insight into its future-

oriented technologies and digital strategy. He added that the MoU provides a roadmap for institutional progress through enhanced ICT competencies, industry-aligned training, certification programmes, and joint Training Needs Assessments aimed at strengthening public sector capacity development.

On his part, James Sun Quan said the partnership goes beyond the provision of technology solutions and focuses on long-term institutional transformation aligned with KSG's strategic vision.

He stated that Huawei will support the institution through customized digital solutions, smart classrooms, smart campus technologies, digital learning platforms, and the Huawei ICT Academy, while also promoting Artificial Intelligence integration in education and workforce development to prepare future-ready public servants.

Michael Kamau, head of the ICT Academy added that Huawei Kenya and the School had already initiated collaboration before the formal agreement through proof-of-concept activities implemented with ICT team under the Phase One project.

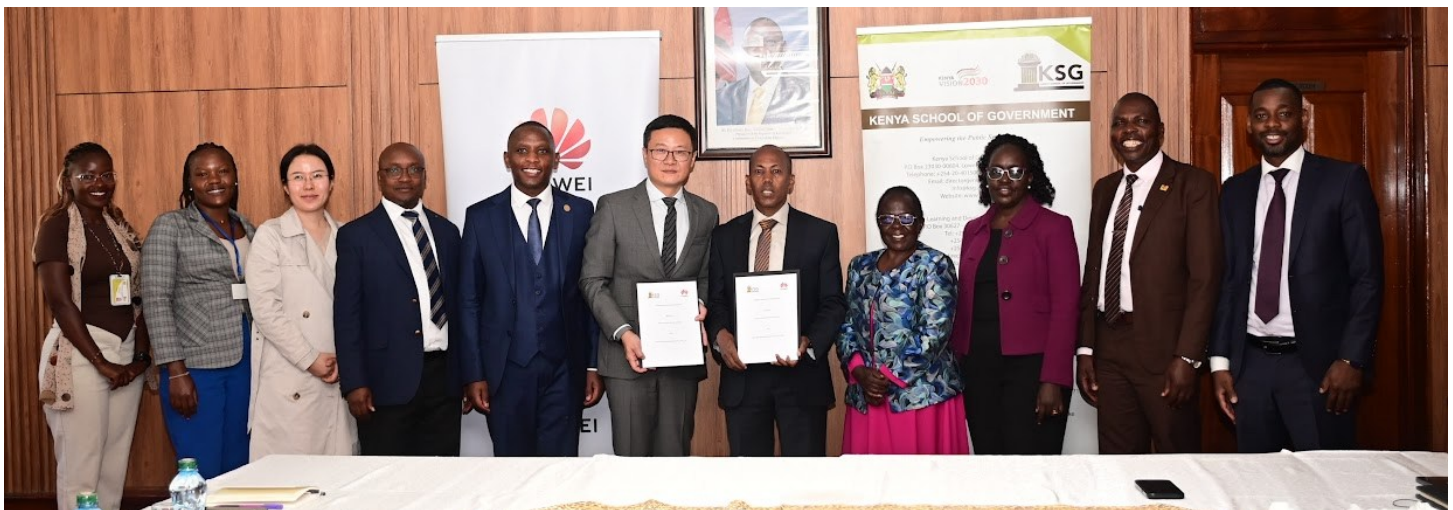
He further noted that Huawei is partnering with the Communications Authority of

From Potential to Execution

This article was inspired by the Connected Africa Summit 2026, held in Nairobi from 27th-30th April 2026. The views expressed are personal and intended to provoke conversation and action within the Kenya School of Government community. Bring your thoughts to the next Innovation Champions meeting. Better yet, bring your actions. And if you are holding a chopstick, for heaven's sake, put it down so your neighbor can eat.

The Connected Africa Summit 2026 in Nairobi unsettled me.

Not because the conversations were louder or more sophisticated, but because one statement cut through the noise with uncomfortable clarity: “We are done discussing potential. We must move to execution.”

Those words forced me to confront a painful truth about public service in Kenya and across Africa. We are not short of ideas. We are drowning in them. We just lack coordinated action.

A computer science puzzle known as the “Dining Philosophers Problem” captures this perfectly. Five philosophers sit around a table. Between each pair lies a single chopstick. To eat, each philosopher needs two

chopsticks. If all five grab one chopstick at the same time, none can eat. Everyone waits. Everyone starves.

That is modern governance.

Our ministries, agencies and institutions often behave like those philosophers. One holds the data. Another controls the budget. Another guards approvals. Another protects systems and mandates. Everyone clings tightly to their “chopstick,” waiting for someone else to move first. Meanwhile, the citizen waits endlessly for services that should already work seamlessly.

At the Summit, one phrase captured this dysfunction perfectly: “data hugging.”

Every institution wants to own information but few want to

share it. Systems are built in isolation. Ministries digitize independently. Counties create parallel platforms. The result is a government filled with technology that cannot speak to itself.

A digital government without interoperability is simply an expensive collection of silos.

The tragedy is that the problem is not technology. Kenya already possesses remarkable digital foundations. Platforms like e-Citizen have transformed service delivery. Fiber connectivity is expanding rapidly. Artificial intelligence and automation are no longer future concepts; they are already reshaping governance and economies globally.

What is missing is rhythm.

One speaker at the summit said something unforgettable: “Before language, there was rhythm.” Before strategy documents and policy frameworks, there was coordinated movement. Progress happens when institutions move together with shared purpose and urgency.

Today, public service has plenty of language but too little rhythm. We produce strategies faster than we implement them. We celebrate planning more than delivery. We reward caution more than execution.

Yet the solution may be simpler than we imagine.

From Potential to Execution

In the Dining Philosophers Problem, deadlock disappears when just one philosopher decides to act differently. One small behavioral change unlocks movement for everyone else.

This lesson matters deeply for the Kenya School of Government.

Our responsibility is to cultivate execution-minded leadership. We must produce officers who can bridge disciplines, collaborate across institutions and turn policy into measurable impact. The future belongs to leaders who understand systems, integration

and action.

The Summit reminds us that government alone cannot drive progress. Innovation emerges from collaboration between public institutions, private enterprise and citizens themselves. Government's role is to create enabling systems, enforce interoperability and build trust across the ecosystem.

Ultimately, citizens do not experience government through policies. They experience it through outcomes.

A farmer does not eat strategy. The youth do not find

employment through conference speeches. A patient does not receive treatment through policy documents.

Execution is what changes lives.

Kenya has already demonstrated immense potential. The question is whether we possess the courage to move beyond discussion and into disciplined, coordinated action.

Because history does not remember those who talked best about transformation.

It remembers those who executed it.

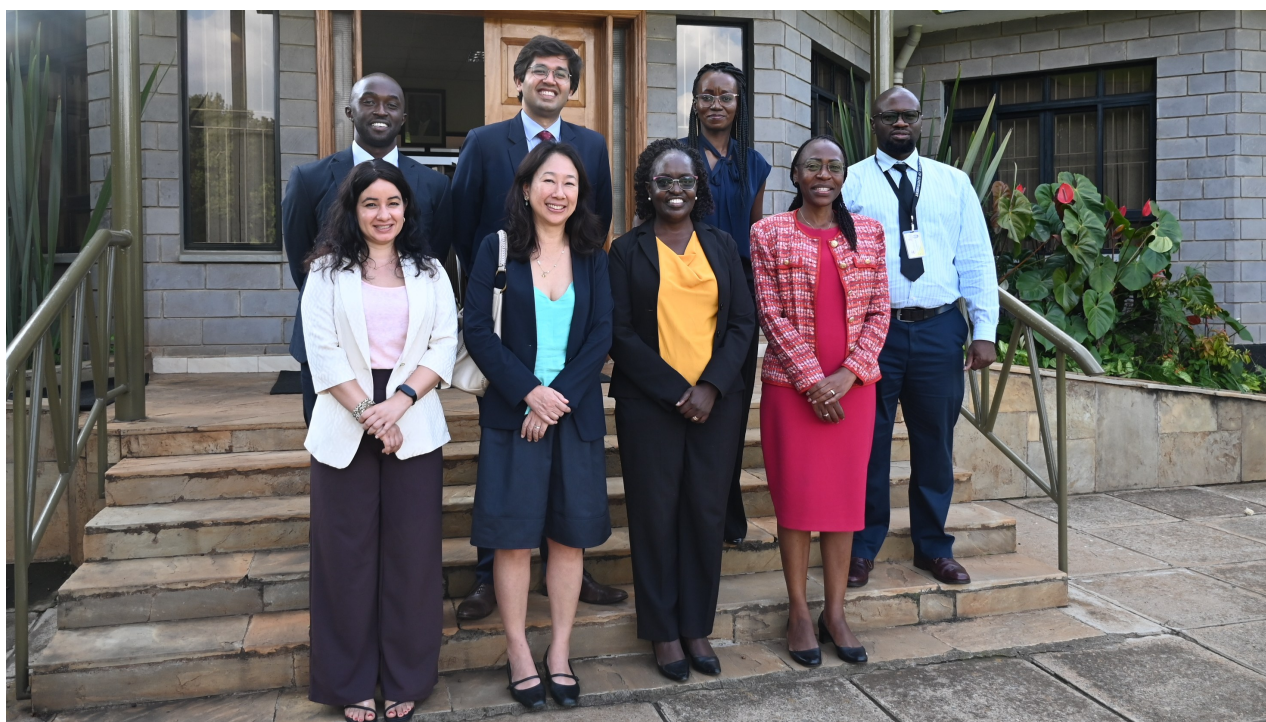
KSG – UNESCO Meet for MOOC Progress and Plans
