KSG@100 : The Next 100 Years Begin Here.

A century is often measured in years. For the Kenya School of Government, however, it is better measured in leaders shaped, institutions strengthened, and a nation continually transformed through capable public service. On July 6th, 2026, as the School marked its centenary, the celebration was less about looking back and more about defining what comes next - a declaration of purpose for the century ahead.

Throughout the KSG@100 celebrations, history met hope in equal measure.

The KSG@100 celebrations opened on a memorable note as Cabinet Secretary Hon. Geoffrey Kiringa Ruku officially unveiled the Rt. Hon. Raila Amolo Odinga Regional Leadership and Governance Academy and Chandaria Innovation Centre, located at the Kenya School of Government, Nairobi.

At the unveiling were Principal Secretaries Dr. Jane Kere Imbunya and Dr. Raymond Omollo,

alongside KSG Council Chair, Justice (Rtd). Charles Nyachae and members of Council, Director General Prof. Nura Mohamed, and industrialist Dr. Manu Chandaria, whose Foundation partnered with KSG to bring the Academy to life. Representing the Odinga family was Ms. Rosemary Odinga, daughter of Rt. Hon. Raila Odinga.

Graduation of 432 officers who successfully completed the Diploma in Public Administration, affirmation of the Leadership Programme for National Transformation cohorts, induction of Deputy County Commissioners, and the recognition of 192 members of staff through Recognition of Prior Learning were not simply ceremonial milestones. KSG's greatest legacy is also found in the leaders it continues to nurture for the future of the world.

CS for Public Service, Human Capital Development and Special Programmes, Hon. Geoffrey

Kiringa Ruku, stressed that investing in institutions that build capable public servants, reaffirming Government's commitment to strengthening leadership and public sector capacity are a foundation for national growth.

"Over the past century, KSG has equipped generations of public servants to serve Kenyans with dedication. Indeed, the nature and character of the services offered by the public service largely depend on the quality of services that the School offers." He said.

This message found powerful expression in the remarks of Principal Secretary for Public Service and Human Capital Development, Dr. Jane Kere Imbunya, who challenged those gathered to view the milestone not as an exercise in nostalgia, but as a call to renewed purpose.

"As we celebrate 100 years of KSG today, we are not simply admiring history," she observed. "We are commissioning KSG for its next journey into yet another

century."

Reflecting on the School's evolution, PS. Imbunya likened KSG to a great tree whose roots honor its pioneers, whose branches shelter today's leaders, and whose new growth carries tomorrow's promise.

The celebrations also reinforced an enduring truth about nation-building, that strong governments are built through the quality of the people entrusted to implement it. Justice (Rtd.) Charles Nyachae, Chairperson of the Kenya School of Government Council, described KSG as one of Kenya's most strategic national institutions. History consistently demonstrates that nations rise or fall on the strength of their institutions.

Looking to the future, KSG Director General, Prof. Nura Mohamed challenged the institution to remain ahead of the forces reshaping governance across the world. Emerging technologies, Artificial Intelligence, climate change,

shifting citizen expectations and increasingly complex policy environments, he noted, require governments that can anticipate change rather than react to it. "We are at war with mediocrity," he declared, reiterating the School's commitment to nurturing competence, excellence and innovation across the public service.

If the past hundred years established the Kenya School of Government as the nation's

premier capacity development institution, the century ahead calls for an institution that continues to read the times, challenge convention and keep public service ready for what comes next.

As Kenya pursues its vision of becoming a globally competitive, high-productivity economy—the Road to Singapore—KSG will continue to shape the thinking, judgement and practice that make national ambition possible.

Charting Kenya's Path to Global Competitiveness: Insights from KSG@100

Kenya's journey towards becoming a globally competitive economy can be defined by the resources it possesses and its capability to translate those resources into productivity, innovation, and mutual prosperity. This was the central message as the Kenya School of Government (KSG) concluded its centenary celebrations at the Lower Kabete Campus at the high-level policy dialogue on Building National Wealth and Global Competitiveness.

The third and final day saw an assembly of policymakers, scholars, public sector leaders, private sector actors, and development partners reckoning the strategic choices required to accelerate Kenya's life-changing agenda.

The conversations placed a spotlight on two crucial drivers of national progress: resource mobilization and evidence-based public policy research. Through keynote addresses, panel discussions, and plenary sessions, delegates examined how Kenya can strengthen its productive

capacity, unlock emerging opportunities, and position itself competitively in the global economy.

Prof. Nick Wanjohi, a professor of Political Economy, who tasked delegates to rethink Africa's development narrative by posing the million-dollar question; What if Africa's greatest resource is not what we lack, but what we fail to harness? He observed that the continent's dilemma has never been a shortage of resources, but the limited capacity to convert them into sustainable economic value advocating for stronger local manufacturing, policies that accredit homegrown industries, and a renewed confidence in African innovation and enterprise.

The dialogue moreover challenged perceptions around dryland regions, publicizing their potential as engines of growth and resilience. Dr. Tahira Mohamed, Regional Partnership and Engagement Lead at the Jameel Observatory, clarified that drylands should be viewed through the lens of landscapes of

opportunity through initiatives such as the Dryland Future Academy and the Dryland Research Academy.

Looking back on KSG's century-long contribution to public leadership and governance, Director General Prof. Nura Mohamed reestablished the School's pledge to nurturing competent leaders, fortifying institutions, and forging ahead evidence-driven policy solutions. He wrapped with a nod to the tenet that the country must transition from planning for expenditure to planning for wealth creation, productivity, and competitiveness.

The High Policy Dialogue culminated in the adoption of a communique outlining strategic actions to accelerate Kenya's change for the better. While KSG commemorates 100 years of service, the dialogue served both as a contemplation on the institution's historic journey and a firm brace towards a forward-looking dedication - A dedication

that building a prosperous and globally competitive Kenya requires bold ideas, disciplined implementation, and leaders equipped to transform vision into measurable impact.

A panel discussion on High Policy Dialogue on Economic Prosperity and Constructive Engagements offered rich insights into the building blocks of national wealth and global competitiveness.

Convening distinguished voices from across the diplomatic and policy spheres, the session illuminated the central role of strategic investment, innovation, and governance in molding sustainable development pathways.

French Ambassador H.E. Arnaud Suquet echoed the worth of sustained investment in human capital, particularly through the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) education, as a catalyst for national change. He expressed that sound public policy, investor confidence, and deeper regional

integration, while framing France's commitment to strengthening its partnership with Kenya.

South Korea's Ambassador, H.E. Prof. Jeom Seok Baek, pondered on his country's development trajectory, pointing to education, technical and vocational training, and coordinated policy frameworks as critical drivers of industrial growth. He noted that aligning education systems with national priorities remains essential in building a competitive and future-ready workforce.

Ambassador Sultan Oglu Hajiyeve from Azerbaijan took his turn to voice to spelt out the value of international partnerships, case in point Kenya -Europe cooperation, in advancing innovation, human capital development, and labour mobility.

Collectively, the panel advocated productivity, innovation, and competitiveness as defining pillars for Kenya's development journey.

As the Kenya School of Government (KSG) marks a century of shaping Kenya's public service, the milestone offers a moment to reflect on the people whose lives have been shaped by the institution and who, in turn, have shaped the nation's public service.

KSG's greatest legacy is not only found in its campuses, programmes or milestones but also in the men and women who have carried its lessons into different spaces. Their individual journeys tell the story of an institution whose influence extends far beyond the classroom. As KSG celebrates its centenary, these stories remind us of enduring impact that is measured through the people it prepares to serve the nation.

Bulletin writers travelled to Embu County to meet Mr. John Njoroge Hiuhu, a former

lecturer, whose 33-year journey mirrors the evolution of the Kenya School of Government. From its days as the Kenya Institute of Administration (KIA) to its evolution to KSG, Mr. Hiuhu reflects on a lifetime of service, growth and the values that have shaped his life long after retirement.

Nearly a decade after leaving active public service, Mr. Hiuhu's passion for service remains undiminished. Today, he divides his time between farming and serving as Chairperson of the Board of Management at St. Luke's School for the Deaf in Embu. Leadership, discipline and values cultivated during his working years have guided him in every responsibility he undertakes.

He vividly remembers the day he joined the then Kenya Institute of Administration on July 28, 1983. "I came in as a lecturer, not knowing that the institution would influence the next thirty-three years of my life," he recalls.

"It wasn't just a place of work; it became a place of learning, growth and service for me." Those early years laid the foundation for a career that would evolve alongside the institution itself.

One of the defining moments of Mr. Hiuhu's career came in 1988, when the introduction of the 8-4-4 education system disrupted operations at the then Kenya Institute of Administration, prompting the redeployment of staff to District Development Institutes across the country. This transition meant leaving Nairobi for Maseno before eventually settling in Embu. Rather than seeing the transfers as a disruption, he embraced them as part of the responsibility that comes with public service. "As public servants, we go where our services are needed," he says. "It may not always be convenient, but the work must continue."

Embu would form one of the most memorable chapters of Hiuhu's career. When he first arrived, the campus had modest facilities and limited resources, that grew to become something greater. Looking back, the transformation still fills him with pride. "Whenever I pass along the road by the Embu Campus, I pause and admire how far it has come," he says. "I remember where we started, and seeing what it has become today gives me great satisfaction."

He also witnessed the transition from the Kenya Institute of Administration and other Government Training Institutes into the Kenya School of Government - change that represented far more than a new name. Reflecting on the

institution's influence, he proudly observes that "every civil servant of substance has passed through KSG," he says.

After retiring from public service in 2016, farming became both a livelihood and a passion, while his role as Chairperson of the Board of Management at St. Luke's School for the Deaf gave him another opportunity to mentor and serve his community. Looking back, he is quick to acknowledge the institution that prepared him for this life beyond government.

More than three decades after he first walked into the then Kenya Institute of Administration, the lessons he learnt continue to influence his leadership, his

service and his commitment to the community. In many ways, his journey reflects the enduring legacy of KSG, a legacy carried not only in lecture halls and

archives, but in the men and women who continue to serve with integrity long after leaving its classrooms.
